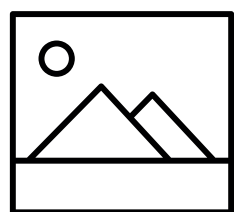
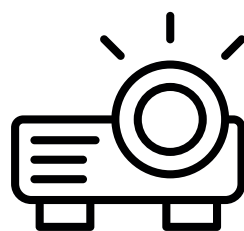


TAPE ART PROJECT

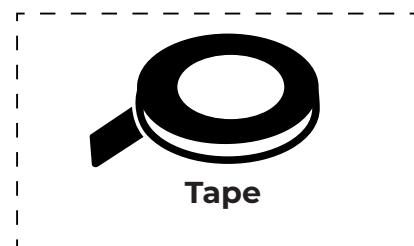
What do you need?



Picture
(analog/digital)



Projector



Empty wall

Tips:

- before you start, search for **inspiration** in Internet or books (<https://www.tapethatcollective.com/projects>)
- best and most economic is to **design your ideas with lines** (the lines should be with the same thickness, if you plan to use only one type on tape thickness (for us most cases). Try not to use filled areas, as this normally need a lot of tape
- you can use an **analog** (overhead) or **digital projector**. Choose the distance from the wall according to the thickness of the tape. You can always produce tape art without any projector
- try to **use special tape art tape** (<https://klebeland.de/>) or **japanese washi tape**. The washi tape is perfect for indoors, as it's cheap, it's easy to tape and take off and it doesn't leave marks on the wall
- the more lines, the more tape you will need. Use **contrast color tape** on the walls, black color always works good
- use scissors or knives (knives only when the wall material is hard enough for that)
- start creating!

Find/make a theme/photo or draw a theme yourself
